Shyness

Recent research in America has shown that shyness is determined by our genes; some people are simply born that way. Strangely enough, it's often those people who look as if they should be most confident (tall people, for example) who are most insecure. The 13-year research has now identified the gene that causes shyness, and the scientists believe that in fact we were all born more or less shy. It's just that some people are able to deal with it better than others. Personal circumstances have an influence as well. Shyness may not seem to be a serious complaint, but for some who suffer from it, it can become unbearable. Even taking to a small

group of people you know can seem like an ordeal - it can feel as if you've been asked to give a speech on a topic you know very little about to a number of experts. You start to feel hot and shaky, your heart beats faster, your knees feel weak, you begin to stutter and the whole experience seems to last forever. The fact of the matter is that shyness is something we often recognise in others: blushing is one of the more visible signs, for example. Yet we don't judge someone harshly because of this. But shyness does mean you're harder to approach, so you become more isolated. As one shy person put it, "It's like being in a prison, and it's very hard to break out". Experts on the subject have come up with various possible solutions, and one has been singled out as being the key to success - namely, finding an interest in common with other people. Spending a lot of time on the sidelines watching other people and envying them because they are much more outgoing doesn't help; remembering that some of the people you most envy are probably shy themselves, does. The secret is how you deal with it. And experts have come up with four things you can do today to help:

Firstly, you can start by listening to other people. You will find yourself getting interested in what they're talking about and asking questions - and before you know it, you'll be having a conversation. Secondly, you could try asking neighbours if you can walk their dog. Like children, pets can be excellent icebreakers for conversations with passers-by. Thirdly, try joining a class to learn something like tap-dancing or flamenco, where people are likely to laugh a lot. You'll feel relaxed, and also you'll be much too busy concentrating on what you're doing to feel shy. Lastly, try telling yourself that it doesn't matter if you say or do something silly. Most people make a fool of themselves every so often – and it's not the end of the world if you do!

Parents Can No Longer Ignore Their Children's Video Game Habits

The National Institute on Media and Family, the nation's leading resource on the effects of media and video games on children, today released its 11th Annual Video Game Report. This year's Video Game Report emphasizes major improvements in retailer policies. It applauds responsible retailers and game console makers for video game safeguards and recommends additional research on positive and negative effects and uses of video games related to school performance, children's health and behavioral development.

David Berner, president and founder of the National Institute on Media and the Family, presented the 11th Annual MediaWise Video Game Report which gave grades to parents, retailers, video game console manufacturers and the Entertainment Software Rating Board (ESRB). While improvements have been made by the video game industry and retailers, parental involvement received an "Incomplete", as surveys showed too few parents following the ESRB's ratings and parental controls on gaming consoles.

"While retailers like Target and Best Buy and game console manufacturers like Sony, Microsoft and Nintendo have made great effort in educating parents on the rating system and installing parental controls on their products, many parents have not followed or used these tools to prevent their kids from playing inappropriate video games," Berner said. "Parents need to pay more attention to the games our kids are playing and how much time they are spending playing games".

Studies continue to show that prolonged game play can harmfully affect a child's physical health and school performance as well as social and behavioral skills. A new study has found almost half of all "heavy gamers", are 6 to 17-years-old. Children who spend more time playing video games are heavier and are more likely to be classified as overweight or obese. The amount of time a child plays video games is correlated with poorer grades in school and attention problems.

"If there is a simple message we can give to parents, it is this 'watch what your kids watch, play what your kids play," continued Berner.

Other areas of special concern highlighted in the 11th Annual Media-Wise Video Game Report include: a retailer survey that shows that game retailers failed to prevent kids from purchasing M-rated video games; the surprisingly easy access to M-rated video games through major retailers' online Web sites, as well as further evidence linking childhood obesity to the amount of time a child plays video games. Similar to previous years, The Annual MediaWise Video Game Report provides parents with a list of recommended video games and games to avoid.
